In September, people across the UK celebrate International Recovery Month to show support for those recovering from substance use disorders and mental health challenges. The goal is to reduce stigma, spread awareness about the benefits of recovery, and emphasise the importance of accessible treatment and support services.

East Sussex County Council organised a week-long event in Eastbourne from September 25th

to 30th at The Beacon Shopping Centre with displays, staff and service users present from 10 am to 4 pm daily. Various support



organisations from the county offer information, advice, and guidance to the community.

ESVH, which manages a recovery activities programme and provides support for residents of HM Prisons, participate in this event with an outside display in the market place.

Also, an event is organised by the East Sussex Recovery Alliance on Wednesday, September 27th, at 5 Harold Place in Hastings. The event will feature a programme of activities from 10 am to 1 pm, including client stories, jazz-based movement, yoga, creative art, and hand massage.





Defence Cuts 'Nuts' says former Minister

Lord Robathan, a former defence minister, has criticised the proposed cuts to Britain's Armed Forces, calling them "completely nuts".

The government's plan is to reduce the regular Army's size from 82,000 troops to 73,000 by 2025. However, the government argues that the Army's total force capacity will still be 100,000 soldiers with the inclusion of reservists.

Lord Robathan served as chief of staff of the prisoner of war guard force in Saudi Arabia, Iraq and Kuwait, and has expressed concerns about the perception that the Armed Forces are declining due to shrinking numbers.

During a House of Lords debate, he urged the new Secretary of State, Grant Shapps, to reconsider the cuts in light of the ongoing conflict in Europe.

Lady Goldie, the Defence Minister, disagreed with Lord Robathan's views, stating that the UK's support for Ukraine has been universally admired and that the government's defence reviews align with its strategic foreign policy objectives.

However, they effectively used their military training and physical fitness to fend off the attackers using

just their paddle.

them react quickly to the situation. Being able to stay fit also played a crucial role in their ability to handle the attack.

The pirates approached them from behind on a flat and wide part of the river, and their malicious intent was clear from their faces.

lan struck one of the attackers with a paddle, and John charged at him. Though John was shot in the shoulder, they managed to disarm the pirates and swim back to their canoe.

Despite the terrifying experience, the two friends plan to return to Peru next summer to complete their fundraising expedition.

The pair are taking on the challenge to raise money for environmental charity Rainforest Concern, the Royal Marines Charity and veterans' charity RV1UK.



Funding for Veteran Accommodation

The Veterans' Capital Housing Fund, administered by the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust, has announced two new programmes that will increase the availability of housing for veterans.

The grants awarded through these programmes will either provide a refurbishment grant to bring veterans' housing up to date, or support organizations in the early stages of complex building projects.

The Refurbishment Grants Program will provide up to £75,000 in grants to refurbish or extend existing accommodations for veterans, whether permanent or transitional. Permanent housing must be affordable and available to veterans through social rent, or be part of a larger facility that provides rented homes to veterans with tailored support, such as care homes.

This program is open to projects that refurbish existing affordable homes for rent to veterans, sites that increase the availability of veteran housing, and properties that meet decent homes and energy efficiency standards.

The Veterans' Capital Housing Fund, is delivered by the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust on behalf of the Office for Veterans' Affairs.

More programmes will become available under this fund in 2023 for larger new build or major refurbishment capital projects.

Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Rt Hon. Johnny Mercer MP, encourages all providers of rented, social housing for veterans to apply and help deliver part of the £20 million capital housing project, as quality housing can make a big difference in helping veterans thrive in civilian life.

Afternote: ESVH were invited to meet the Minister recently, sponsored by local MP Sally-Ann Hart.

The Minister outlined the development of support for veterans being achieved through Op Courage (NHS mental health treatment]), Op Fortitude (Housing)

and Op Restore (Support for those with physical challenges) ..



It is anticipated that ESVH will have further contact with the Office of Veteran Affairs, certainly as projects addressing accommodation for veterans progresses.

ESVH are currently considering the provision of supported accommodation locally, to meet an evident demand and ease the limited availability of appropriate housing stock in East Sussex through local authorities.



AAC 'Drop In'

Over the course of two days, a British Army Apache AH-64 helicopter, renowned as one of the world's most advanced attack helicopters, had to make two precautionary landings.

The Army confirmed that there was no threat to the public or the aircrew during either landing.

The helicopter was participating in Exercise Cobra Warrior when it was forced to land prematurely in Kirkby Lonsdale in Cumbria on the first day, and then in the village of Caton in Lancashire on the following day.



Upon landing in Caton, the crew showed nearby members of the public around the aircraft, and one fortunate schoolboy even had the opportunity to see inside the cockpit.

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A spokesperson stated that both landings were due to the same technical issue, but assured that there was no danger to anyone involved.

The Ministry of Defence has not released any details regarding the technical issue, but the aircraft returned to the Nesscliffe Training Area.

The Apache AH-64 has been utilized by the British Army in various conflicts, including Libya, Iraq, and Afghanistan. Presently, the Army is upgrading its fleet by introducing the new Apache AH-64E into frontline service.

The AH-64E replaces the Apache Mk.1, which has been in service since 2001 and has proven to be a vital asset. The new variant provides the Army with a cutting-edge attack aviation capability that will be a crucial factor in how they fight in the coming years as outlined in the Future Soldier programme.



NAAFI Serve RFA

The Royal Fleet Auxiliary recently introduced its very first Navy, Army, and Air Force Institutes (Naafi) shop on board one of its vessels, RFA Lyme Bay.

This new addition provides the crew with a sense of familiarity and convenience. The shop recently opened and is now available to the ship's company and embarked forces as they prepare to set sail to the Indo-Pacific as part of the Littoral Response Group South deployment.

RFA Lyme Bay announced that this new "spanking new" shop will boost morale and is a first for the Royal Fleet Auxiliary. The shop offers typical corner shop goods like toiletries, crisps, and chocolate.

RFA Lyme Bay is one of three Bay-class RFA vessels that allow personnel to move from ship to shore using onboard Landing Craft Vehicle Personnel and Landing Craft Utility vessels.



The Naafi announced plans to open shops on board RFA Mounts Bay and RFA Argus.

The Naafi has been providing services to the Armed Forces since its establishment by the government in 1920 and already has a presence on board most Royal Navy ships.

Rifleman Richard King 24363714

Richard was born in the North East in 1958 and served with the 4th & 7th Battalions, Light Infantry, including a tour of Northern Ireland, mid 1970. After returning to civilian life, he eventually found himself in Hastings, from around 2003.

Whilst here, he kept himself to himself amongst a select group of mates living in Hollington. He was a confident but gentle person, who with his familiar 'Geordie' accent, made friends easily.

He did move to Scotland for a period of around five years, where he met Helen, who became his soul mate. She became the love of his life! Sadly, Helen passed away earlier this year, and losing Helen created a lot of personal pain for Richard.

Throughout recent years, since around 2016, Richard had close support from SSAFA, East Sussex Veterans Hub and East Sussex Recovery Alliance in Hastings. In particular, he grew to claim ESRA as his 'family' and would visit them, with Helen, any time they were open, always getting a hot meal and staying to enjoy friends and company for as long as possible. He would drop in on Mondays at ESVH for breakfast and a chat, often en route to ESRA.

More recently, Richard was allocated a selfcontained flat in Bexhill, where he became settled and began to adjust to living alone again, with the support of ESVH and ESRA. It was here, in Bexhill, that Richard passed peacefully.

Richard was a great character, His funeral was held on 13 September at Bexhill Cemetery and attended by his friends and comrades from ESVH and ESRA.
